The prudent see danger and take refuge, but the simple keep going and pay the penalty.

The Principle of the Path:

Direction (not intention) determines destination.

The Path Principle applies to our financial path, dating and relationship path, marriage path, spiritual life, parenting, job, career, etc. In each of these areas, people often have great intentions, hopes, and dreams for where they want to go in life, but then in their daily and weekly actions and decisions, they choose a path that leads to a much different destination.

Solomon's Answer (Proverbs 3:5-6)
